



Lady Mary Wroth	<p style="text-align: center;">Pamphilia to Amphilanthus By Lady Mary Wroth (1587-1651/3)</p> <p><i>Pamphilia to Amphilanthus</i> is the first sonnet sequence written by an Englishwoman. Published in 1621, the poems invert the usual format of sonnet sequences by making the speaker a woman (Pamphilia, whose name means “all-loving”) and the beloved a man (Amphilanthus, whose name means “lover of two.”). It is possible that Wroth based the story on her own fraught relationship with her cousin, William Herbert.
